Section A

Answer Question 01.

Source A

From William Laud, 'The Works of William Laud', published after his death in 1645 as justification for his religious policies.

This I have observed: That no one thing hath made men more wavering in their own minds, or more apt to be drawn aside from the sincerity of religion professed by the Church of England, than the lack of uniform and decent order in so many churches of the kingdom. The worship of God in His Church is the great witness to the world, that our heart stands right in that service of God. These thoughts have made me labour so much as I have done for decency and an orderly settlement of the external worship of God in the Church. Ceremonies are the fence that protect the substance of religion from all the indignities too commonly put upon it.

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Source B

From the Impeachment Articles of the House of Commons brought against William Laud, February 1641.

Laud hath traitorously assumed to himself a papal and tyrannical power, both in Ecclesiastical and Temporal Matters, over His Majesty's subjects in England, and other places, to the undermining of the Crown and the dishonour of His Majesty. Laud claims the King's ecclesiastical jurisdiction as part of his Archbishop's office and denies it derives from the Crown.

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Laud hath traitorously endeavoured to alter and subvert God's true religion by law established in this realm. Instead he has set up Popish Superstition and Idolatry. He hath imposed Popish ceremonies and cruelly persecuted those who have opposed them by corporal punishment and imprisonment.

Laud hath traitorously and wickedly endeavoured to reconcile the Church of England with the Church of Rome.
